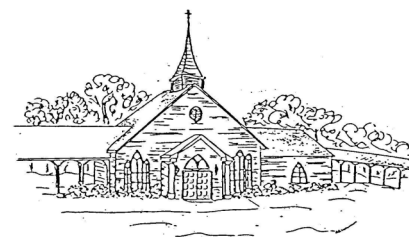

Dear People of Annunciation,



In just a few short months, we will elect a new bishop for the Diocese of Georgia. I have included this month some of the frequently asked questions concerning the process.

Why do we need a bishop?

In our Anglican tradition the bishop is the center and focus of how we do church. Our name, Episcopal, means “of bishops.” The ancient meaning of the word referred to an overseer, and the bishop offers a ministry of oversight over a group of congregations. The bishop brings us together as a larger community than an individual parish, maintains our connection to the very first Christians (see Philippians 1:1 and 1 Peter 5:2), ensures that we practice the faith as it has been passed down to us, and ensures that those called to ordained leadership are appropriately trained and sacramentally affirmed.

What does a bishop do?

“The ministry of a bishop is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as apostle, chief priest, and pastor of a diocese; to guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the whole Church; to proclaim the Word of God; to act in Christ’s name for the reconciliation of the world and the building up of the Church; and to ordain others to continue Christ’s ministry.” (Book of Common Prayer, p. 855). In practice, a bishop generally presides and preaches at a different congregation every week, baptizes, confirms, and ordains, oversees the work of diocesan ministries, and acts as pastor for the clergy.

Why do we elect a bishop?

The sharing of lay and clerical authority is a bedrock in the Episcopal Church, as is the affirmation of call by the community one is called to serve. We elect our bishops so that the whole diocese has ownership in the process and can feel confident that the new bishop really is our bishop, chosen by the majority of delegates to the Annual Convention of the diocese.

What is the timeline for finding our next bishop?

There are several steps, each taking a number of weeks. First we listen to the diocese: Listening Sessions begin in February and go through the end of March. Next we create a profile based on that listening, to describe who we are, where we are called to go, and the kind of leadership we believe will take us there. The profile was published on May 8. Applications will be received until June 7, after which the search committee will go through several screening stages to arrive at a slate of 4-5 nominees by the beginning of September. The nominees will visit the diocese in October, and then the election takes place at our Annual Convention on November 15-16 in Statesboro. The bishop will be consecrated after consents have been received from other dioceses, on May 30, 2020.

Who is eligible to be nominated as our bishop?

The canons state that a bishop must be at least 30 years old at consecration and must resign from all jurisdiction at 72 years of age. Any priest or bishop in good standing in any of the churches of the Anglican Communion is eligible; however, a bishop diocesan may not enter an election process until he or she has completed five years in the position to which he or she was elected.

What is the process for nomination?

The Standing Committee establishes the process for nomination. For our election, nominations and applications of qualified individuals will be accepted from across the Episcopal Church. Two forms will be made available when the profile is published: one form for those being nominated by someone else and a second for those nominating themselves.

Can other nominees be added later?

Once the slate has been announced, additional candidates who meet the requirements for election may be added by petition. The Petition process is open for ten days following the release of the slate. Petitions require signatures from one clergy person and one lay person from each of the six convocations of the diocese. Forms for petition candidates will be available on this site when the profile has been published.

Who elects our bishop?

The election will take place at our Annual Convention in November. All clergy resident in the diocese have a vote. The lay delegates elected by each parish for the Convention each will have a vote. Balloting will take place until a single nominee receives a majority of votes from both lay people and clergy on the same ballot. The election must be consented to within 120 days by a majority of bishops with jurisdiction and a majority of Standing Committees across the Episcopal Church.

How many dioceses are there?

There are 111 dioceses in The Episcopal Church, so a majority would be 56 consents.

THY KINGDOM COME

Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray for more people to come to know Jesus. What started in 2016 as an invitation from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York to the Church of England has grown into an international and ecumenical call to prayer. During the 11 days of Thy Kingdom Come, it is hoped that everyone who takes part will

- Deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ
- Pray for God's spirit to work in the lives of those they know
- Come to realize that every aspect of their life is the stuff of prayer

After the very first Ascension Day the disciples gathered with Mary, constantly devoting themselves to prayer while they waited for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Like them, our reliance on the gift of the Holy Spirit is total – on our own we can do nothing.

Through the centuries Christians have gathered at that time to pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit. 'Thy Kingdom Come' picks up this tradition. Over the past three years more and more worshipping communities have dedicated the days between Ascension and Pentecost to pray 'Come Holy Spirit'. We are praying that the Spirit would inspire and equip us to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with our friends and families, our communities and networks. It has been amazing how many varied ways there have been in which people from every tradition have taken up this challenge. The effects have been remarkable.

It is our prayer that those who have not yet heard the Good News of Jesus Christ and his love for the world will hear it for themselves, and respond and follow Him. Specifically, we again invite each and every Christian across the country to pray that God's Spirit might work in the lives of 5 friends who have not responded with their 'Yes' to God's call.

Whether you have joined in 'Thy Kingdom Come' before or not, we invite you to take part this year – along with churches from over 65 different denominations in 114 countries around the world.

"You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses ...to the ends of the earth. When he had said this...he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight...Then they returned to Jerusalem ... and were constantly devoting themselves to prayer... 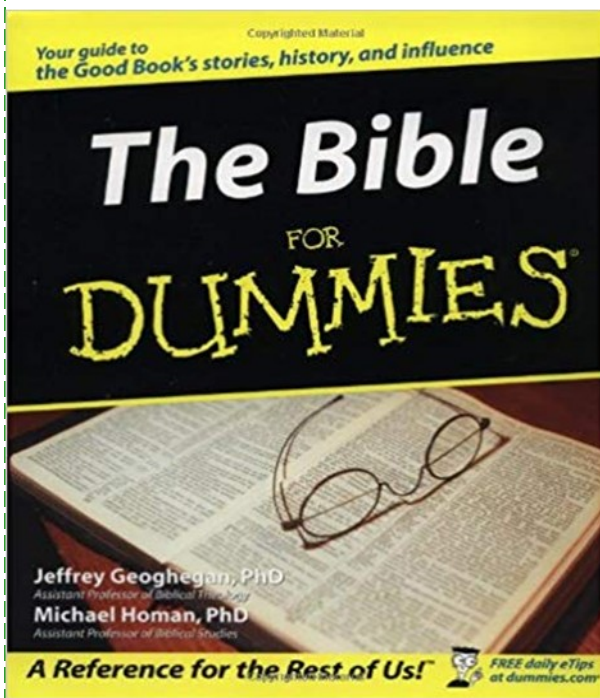

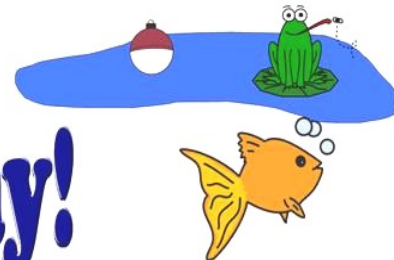

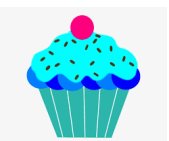

Vestry Meeting Minutes – Annunciation – April 29, 2019 at 6:00 pm

Meeting opened by Rev. Denise with prayer. Study of Acts 11 was completed.

Vestry meeting minutes, March 2019, were reviewed; members present had no comments. Rev. Denise will email vestry members to request approval of March 2019 vestry meeting minutes.

Treasurer's Report: (Anne) March 2019 Financial Report was reviewed. As needed, funds will be taken from other account(s) and placed in General Fund. Discussion of the line item budget to which youth funds will be applied. Treasurer recommended that we open a Fidelity Investment account to use for parish stock gift transactions. Fidelity charges \$4.95 per transaction vs 2% of sale charged by Morgan Stanley. Rev. Denise will email vestry members to request approval of March 2019 financial report.

Business: Quorum Not Present – No issue approvals.

Senior Warden's Report: Hugh absent.

Junior Warden's Report: (Jack) Landscaping Upgrade: Planting of all large plants is complete. Irrigation system repairs are complete. There is a need to fertilize and apply post-emergent weed killer to the grass. Harry Moses to help determine best way to apply required products. Pressure washing and painting portions of the church were discussed. Chipping paint needs attention. Rev. Denise to discuss possibility that youth would like to help with painting. LED lights to be replaced in church nave with the same bulbs as the test chandelier. Alexander Brothers will fix fan motor for air conditioner in the church; cost less than \$900. The Organ Console will continue to be stored but the old organ pipes are no longer needed. Rev. Denise to discuss with David the best way for disposition of old organ pipes. Rev. Denise suggested that the bushes around the church need to be pruned. The Indian Hawthorne bed between the church and the columbarium are in particular need of a trim.

Deacon's Report: Dcn. Burt absent.

Rector's Report: (Rev. Denise) Rev. Denise provided MAPDASH portal information to the committee that discussed this application with Canon Frank Logue. Committee will meet at a later date to discuss ways to use the data being reviewed. The Episcopal Safety Program, Safety Survey results for Annunciation were provided in a letter dated April 23, 2019. Discussion of results will continue and final disposition of recommendations will require a vestry quorum. Brass plaques indicating donors of pew cushions will be mounted on the pews. Baptism of John Floyd Ladson will be on May 19, 2019. Feast of the Ascension will be May 30.

Next Vestry meeting will be held TUESDAY, May 28 at 6 pm, due to Memorial Day.
