Well, here we are again. Another year has ended and it's time to look back on where we've been, while also looking forward to what's coming in the year ahead. As I was doing this in preparation for this report, I was reminded of the charge that was laid upon me by a Bishop in my ordination to the Priesthood that: "As a priest, it will be your task to proclaim by word and deed the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and to fashion your life in accordance with its precepts. You are to love and serve people among whom you work, caring alike for young and old, strong and weak, rich and poor. You are to preach, to declare God's forgiveness to penitent sinners, to pronounce God's blessing, to share in the administration of Holy Baptism and in the celebration of the mysteries of Christ's Body and Blood, and to perform the other ministrations entrusted to you" (The Book of Common Prayer, p. 531).

My job among you as your Priest and Pastor is to proclaim God's Word, the Good News to you in Word and Sacrament, not only on Sunday mornings but also in all the places of life where you serve, struggle, hurt, and labor. By God's grace and with a lot of prayer, I have striven to do this and I trust that the Holy Spirit has been at work among you transforming you into the image of Christ, because we have an important mission. Read BCP pg. 855 "What is the Mission of the Church." Annunciation was called into existence to witness to the good news of God's love that was shown to us in Jesus Christ. We exist to share God's love, to bring people into a fellowship in which God's love is shared, and to help people grow into followers of Jesus. There are people, perhaps many people, within the reach of our church who are hungry for the love of God that we were given to share. Our church has been commissioned to teach the way of love that is the hope of the world. Most of those hungry people probably don't realize how urgently they need to learn the way of love, but the need is great.

This past year, the Episcopal Church received an invitation from our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry to practice the Way of Love. The Way of Love is a way of life committed to following Jesus and committed to a set of practices: Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, Go, Rest. Bishop Curry writes: In the first century Jesus of Nazareth inspired a movement. A community of people whose lives were centered on Jesus Christ and committed to living the way of God's unconditional, unselfish, sacrificial, and redemptive love. Today, Curry says, our vocation is to live as the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement. Dear people, our church has a very important mission. We are called to live the Jesus Movement in this place, at this time, and we do this by working together using our varied gifts given to us by God. And work together we do. We work and play and worship together and as is always the case—we do this in the midst of both pain and joy—loss and hope, good news and not so good news. 2019 was no different. There is much good news to share but let me share the not so good news first.

We've had people we hold dear die or move away this past year which is always the most difficult part of our life together. Also, the financial reality of doing ministry here in this place is rising and while our situation is not dire right now, we know that the next few years will determine the future for our church. Just as it takes everyone using their gifts to grow the church, it takes everyone willing to give of their treasure to make sure we continue to be a presence in Vidalia. Pledges are down from 2019 and you can see the projected deficit for 2020 is larger than what was realized in 2019. There is no excess in the 2020 budget. The truth is soon we will have to make some difficult decisions if we continue to carry such a large deficit. I hope and pray that our Lord will place upon all our hearts the necessity to do our part; for we do have an important mission given to us by God.

Yet, in the midst of the difficult times and not so good news, there is much good news and the good news this past year is that we are growing. We have added several new families to our congregation, mostly young people. What a joy it has been to have acolytes at the altar, along with new lectors and Eucharistic Ministers. And what a joy it was to send young people to camp with the help of your donations. Also, our buildings and grounds remain in good working order thanks to our Junior Warden, Jack Dell. The landscaping project undertaken by a group of you was so needed and has made a beautiful difference to the outside of our church. Our small food pantry continues to help those in need. Every committee and group has worked hard. The fruit of your time, talent, and treasure has produced good ideas and ministry opportunities of which you can read about in their reports. Please take time to read them. They witness to the good work that is being done here to the service of God.

I hope and pray that if you are not serving in one of the many ministry's available that you will seriously consider joining and helping or leading. It takes a village. God calls us to be about this work together and the possibilities are endless if we are committed to building God's kingdom in this place. We have a lot to offer, meaningful worship and welcoming hospitality and there are people out there that need to hear about us. A very important part of reaching out is the sharing of our faith with others. Most newcomers visit a congregation because someone from that congregation invited them. It is you that will continue to grow this church, not just me. But without a personal invitation, few new people will walk through our doors. We all have to be committed to growing this congregation. Those future generations, our young people are depending on us my friends and we have much work to do.

I look forward to our continuing to work together to look for opportunities and ways to serve God and our neighbor in this new year. And I am the first to admit I cannot be everything to everyone or please everyone but I promise to do the very best job I can with God's help. Together we can make a difference...so let us go forth to love and serve the Lord.

# **Junior Warden's Report**

The Junior Warden is charged with the care of Church Property.

Major activities undertaken during 2019 included:

- 1. Completing the replacement of all incandescent florescent lighting with LED bulbs. Funding for this was provided by a Georgia Power grant. These new LED bulbs provide improved lighting at substantially less cost.
- 2. Replacing the Hot Water Heater in the old church building.
- 3. Work on the sewer line to improve flow from the Church to the main sewer line at the street.
- 4. Significant work on the shrubbery around the church. This included removing much of the old shrubbery and replacing with new shrubbery.
- 5. Work on the irrigation system, including replacing the timer boxes and several damaged sprinkler heads.

In 2020 we plan to:

- 1. Replace the two outside lights that illuminate the large sign in the front yard.
- 2. Replace the hot water heater in the Church Sacristy.
- 3. Perform additional landscaping around the Church.
- 4. Replace the soffit boards on the Parish Hall and repaint as necessary.
- 5. Correct other maintenance issues as they arise. The Church property is aging (the new church building is 20 years old, and other buildings are much older). In buildings this old, we need to expect maintenance issues.

If you have any questions, or can think of additional maintenance issues, please let me know.

In all cases, Pastoral Care members assisted congregants by visiting, providing food, and the flowers used in worship services, running errands or any other way we could support members in need. Monetary donations can be made to the Pastoral Care Restricted Fund.



# **Outreach**

Outreach Activities for the year included:

- Annunciation hosted the 4th UGA Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (Cooking classes for parents and families)
- St. Francis Memorial Garden for Pets was used for the spreading of pet ashes during the annual Blessing of the Pets in October. Many pets and pet owners participated in the event.
- Annunciation continues to donate (monthly) \$50 to the United Way and Salvation Army, and \$100 to J.D.
  Dickerson Backpack Buddies program. Donations are also ongoing for non-perishable food and other
  items for the Refuge and for SOAPS.
- A small food pantry located in the old Sanctuary has helped several dozen people. Donations are always needed and welcome.
- School supplies were collected and donated to J.D. Dickerson Elementary School.
- Several of our youth and adults attended the County Wide Back to School Bash at Southeast Technical College in July and gave out bottles of cold water to hundreds of parents and students.
- Items were collected for the Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child Project from the congregation. Our youth and several adults packed 31 shoeboxes.
- Several parishioners participated in the Habitat build. The house will soon be completed.
- Girl Scout Troop # 30132 meets twice a month in our Parish Hall.
- In April, the Rev. Canon Frank Logue presented to a small group, *Map Dash For Faith Communities*. Map Dash is an interactive, data-grounded, map-based tool for missional analysis and planning. This Data can be used to explore neighborhoods through the lenses of population characteristics, community issues, and community resources.
- Little Free Library located on church grounds is filled with books for the neighborhood to access for reading.

# **Episcopal Church Women**

While few formal meetings were held in 2019, ECW was still quite active within the congregation. In addition to providing a monthly Coffee Hour following the 10:30 service, the ECW gave wedding gifts to church members and hosted baby showers. ECW members sponsored the Food Talk series in January, February, and March of 2019 in our Parish Hall and eight people were graduated. Participants learned about healthy eating, how to shop smart for groceries, and to prepare nutritious meals for their families. Two Parents' Night Out events were hosted, one in March and again in October. Our children and their friends enjoyed food, fun, and learning activities while their parents had the evening off. ECW members also spearheaded the Operation Christmas Child Project in November. With the efforts of many church members and our children, dozens of shoe boxes were filled with basic-need, toys and school supply items for children in need throughout the world. The most intensive efforts of the group centered on the Rummage Sale held November 2nd and 9th. A total of \$3160.60 was raised from the sale and will be used throughout the coming year to assist community families with expenses such as utilities, medical travel and other needs. Together, ECW and the whole congregation were able to help SEVEN families with their Christmas wishes through the Angel Tree this year. Walmart gift certificates were also provided to each family. Current balance in ECW account is: \$3923.22. The members of ECW look forward to spreading God's glory through service and fellowship in 2020



# About A Spring in the Desert

The Diocese of Georgia's bishop-elect Frank and his wife, Victoria, offer a Lenten journey inspired by the many passages of scripture that use images of water in the desert as a sign of the healing and wholeness that come through God alone. To this they add the distilled wisdom of the Desert Mothers and Fathers and the surprisingly rich inspiration of the plants and animals that thrive in an arid land. Along the way, they will share the ways our faith speaks to the barren places in our lives and how those times of drought can be a source of strength. In addition to the books, the Logue's created a series of 20 online



videos which are 5-6 minutes long to be watched by a group and discussed. There are four videos each for the five weeks from the week after Ash Wednesday through the week before Holy Week.

# Bishop-Elect's Ordination No Tickets Needed to Attend

The planned May 30th liturgy for the ordination and consecration of the 11th Bishop of Georgia will be open to all who wish to attend. The diocesan staff has received calls and emails with people wanting to know how to get tickets for this event, so we wanted to clarify that no ticket or RSVP is needed. The Johnny Mercer Theater at the Savannah Civic Center has

enough seating that we need not use tickets or any other system to keep down the number attending. The liturgy will begin

promptly at 11 AM. The service is expected to end by 1:30 PM and a reception with the new bishop will follow in the hallway outside the theater. Likewise, no tickets are needed for the May 31st Eucharist in Forsyth Park, Savannah (shown at right). Presiding Bishop Michael Curry will preach, with the newly ordained bishop celebrating the Eucharist. This liturgy will begin promptly at 11 AM, but choirs will begin singing at 10:30 AM for those arriving for the service. We will be on the grass in the park and seats will not be provided. As with concerts and other events at this venue, participants will need to bring their own chairs. There will be plenty of room and we encourage you to invite friends, family, and co-workers who might want to come to the Savannah for the memorable open air worship service. Food trucks will be on hand for those looking for an easy place to get a good lunch after the service.

Deacon's Report: Rev. Dcn. Burt continues to be absent due to work.


