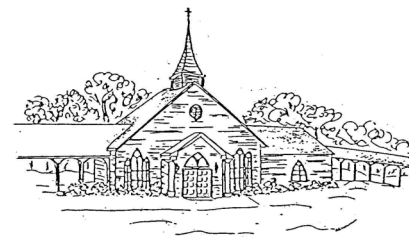

Dear People of Annunciation,



Holy Week begins Sunday, April 5 and unfortunately, it will be a very different week for many of us. I'm sure there will be many congregations offering Holy Week services on their Facebook pages or on YouTube.

During this sacred week, Christians reflect on the Passion of Jesus Christ, who was crucified on Good Friday and rose from the dead on Easter Sunday to give new life to all who believe. Holy Week is also the week leading up to the joy of Easter Sunday when we recognize God's goodness in sending His Son to die for our sins.

I found this simple guide to understanding Holy Week as a biblical journey through the week leading to the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. You begin each day with a prayer for clarity and understanding of the reading.

Prayers for Every Day During Holy Week

Ask the Lord to reveal Himself to you through your reading and quiet time. Read each of the scriptures slowly. Take a few minutes to process what you have read. Reflect on what it teaches you about the character of God as revealed through His son, Jesus Christ.

PALM SUNDAY

On Palm Sunday, Jesus entered Jerusalem with the disciples riding a borrowed donkey. When Jesus arrived, He was greeted with celebration and shouts of Hosanna. This was the beginning of the end of his human life. Read and reflect on each of the accounts of this day.

Keep a journal. This is for you to explore and understand more of your faith in any way that you choose. It's also a wonderful tool to use to take notes, write down additional resources, and even look back on next year to see how far you've grown in your faith during this week's observances.

HOLY MONDAY

On Holy Monday, as Jesus was traveling from Bethany, he cursed a fig tree for not bearing fruit. It is important to reflect on this passage and how this relates to your faith. Jesus then enters the temple and asserts his authority by throwing everyone out who was doing business inside the temple complex. The Jewish leaders began plotting how to kill Jesus because of this display of power. Jesus was ruining their racket.

HOLY TUESDAY

On Holy Tuesday, the chief priest, temple leaders, and elders challenged Jesus' knowledge of scripture. They raised a number of theological debates with him and questioned both his teaching and by which authority he has to teach his followers. Jesus responds in parables and directly warns his disciples against the teachers of the law.

SPY WEDNESDAY

On Spy Wednesday, Jesus continued his teaching. He spoke of the destruction of the temple and of the end times. He shared more parables and spoke of the withered fig tree. This continued to greatly upset the Jewish leaders. Their anger continued to grow once they heard of the woman who honored Jesus by anointing him with really expensive oil. This also angered Judas and he went straight to the religious authorities and offered to deliver Jesus into their hands.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

On Maundy Thursday, Jesus celebrated the Passover, which is also known as the Last Supper, with his disciples. After they finished supper, Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray and instructed the disciples to also pray that they do not fall into temptation. This is where Judas finds Jesus and betrays Him by bringing the chief priest, temple leaders and elders. Jesus was arrested and tortured while Peter denied Him three times just as Jesus said He would.

GOOD FRIDAY

On Good Friday, the Jewish leaders, with the help of Pilate, presented Jesus to a crowd and held a mock trial that resulted in a death sentence for the one who would be called the King of the Jews. Jesus was crucified on the cross and one of Jesus' disciples requested His body to properly prepare for burial.

HOLY SATURDAY

On Holy Saturday, since it was the day before the Sabbath, Jesus' body was placed in a nearby tomb. The chief priests and the Pharisees went to Pilate requesting an order for the tomb to be made secure with a guard until the third day. They went and made the tomb secure by placing a large stone in front of the entrance and posting a guard outside.

EASTER SUNDAY

On Easter Sunday, a couple of women went to the tomb where Jesus' body was kept to anoint Him with oil for burial. But when they arrived, He wasn't there. The tomb was empty and an angel greeted them with the news that Jesus was alive. The women hurried back to tell the others and Jesus surprised his grieving disciples by showing up in their midst.

After reading through each of the scriptures walking you through Holy Week, what did you learn about God? What did you learn about yourself? Slow down for just a moment each day. Dive into the scriptures. If you have a study Bible, read the notes. Research online for multiple commentaries that accompany each passage. You may find a whole new reason, purpose and expanded understanding of Easter Sunday. While it's known for the resurrection of Jesus, we must take into account the big picture, or rather, the whole story. You can even make this a family gathering to sit and worship together. Take turns reading from the scriptures to gain another experience of understanding of Holy Week and the upcoming Easter holiday.

An Idea for Maundy Thursday: We Prepare

Stripping of the Table:

Stripping of the altar (removing all ornaments, linens, candles, plants, flowers, etc.) is an ancient custom of the Church. Congregations mark the way Christ's life was stripped from him by stripping the altar of all signs of life and beauty during a special service. This almost-bare worship space reminds us of the bareness of life without the hope of Christ that we have through His resurrection.

- This beautiful and powerful ceremony can also be practiced in the home, as our homes are also places of worship.
- Materials needed: Bible or Prayer Book, storage box or bin, dark cloth, cleaning supplies.
- Read Psalm 22 together (or just the first two verses, if attention spans are short).
- Explain the ancient custom of stripping and washing the altar, what it symbolizes, and how your family will now do a similar stripping in your home – focusing on icons and symbols of your faith.

- Send your family through the house to gather all icons and religious symbols that can be easily moved (crosses, statues, candles, prayer beads, etc.). Ask everyone to work silently as a sign of respect for the task. Pack these items away in the storage bins.
- Use the dark cloth to drape any other items that are too large or permanent to pack away (wall art, door wreaths, Easter Tree and so forth.)
- Finally, remove all items from your dining or kitchen table and together wash the table thoroughly.
- Leave the table bare until Easter morning.
- After all the icons have been packed away or covered, and the table has been washed, take a moment to notice how your home looks and feels. Help kids make the connection between a home without these beautiful and meaningful items and a life without Christ.
- Saturday night, after everyone is in bed, do your best to unpack and uncover all of the religious items, so that when the family wakes up on Easter morning there will be more than just Easter baskets to celebrate!

Family Footwashing:

Jesus washed the feet of his friends as an act of love, service, and preparation. Take turns washing one another's feet as an act of love and service, in preparation for the journey you will take from Maundy Thursday to Easter morning.

I pray this biblical journey through Holy Week will be meaningful for you. Please keep praying for our Lord's healing touch upon our world and may God show us mercy.

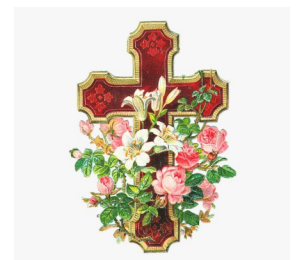

Vestry Meeting Minutes – Annunciation – February 24, 2020 at 6:00 pm

Members Present: The Very Reverend Denise Vaughn, Rebecca Miller, Jack Dell, Teresa Barrera-Edge, Jerry Yates, Dorsey McMichael

Member Absent: Matt Storkamp

Treasurer Present: Frank Champion; Clerk Present: Beverly Thompson; Deacon Absent: Rev. Dcn. Burt Derrick
Meeting opened by Rev. Denise with prayer.

Study of Acts 19 was completed.

Minutes of Called Vestry Meeting on 1/26/2020 were reviewed; Jack moved to approve the minutes with one correction, 2nd by Rebecca, motion passed.

Vestry Meeting minutes for January 2020 were reviewed; Jack moved to approve minutes, 2nd by Rebecca, motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: (Frank) The January 2020 Financial Report was presented and reviewed. January ended with budgeted deficit of \$5,309. Around \$44000 is in Restricted Funds. Frank noted that a \$19,000 stock donation has been given in February and will show up on February Financial Report. By April, Vestry will need to discuss taking money from Investment Accounts and putting that money into General Fund. Frank will not serve as a check signer; however, he needs to have access to church accounts for purpose of review and analysis. Frank suggests that Vestry look at Restricted Funds and consider combining or eliminating some more of them. He also suggests that a separate bank account might be considered for Restricted Funds. Frank plans to do a detailed financial analysis of the last seven years at a later time. Rev. Denise presented a sample of the Quick Books Financial Report which will be used in the future for monthly reports. Jack moved to approve the Financial Report, 2nd by Jerry, motion passed.

Senior Warden's Report: (Rebecca) Rebecca expressed gratitude to Vestry Members, old and new, for their service.

Junior Warden's Report: (Jack) Outside lights by church sign have been replaced. Invoice for estimated amount of \$250 to \$300 yet to be received. He recommends this cost be charged to General Fund - Building and Maintenance. He has an estimate from Harry Harper for repair of fascia board on Parish Hall in the amount of \$650. This will include bleach and pressure wash, repair of leaks and rot damage, and painting of fascia. He also has an estimate of \$1400 to bleach and pressure wash the Office Building, where water damage is visible on fascia; this includes painting walls, trim, and fascia. If this proposal is approved, the contractor can do the work in the next few weeks and will be finished before Easter season. Jack has requested an additional estimate; however, he is not hopeful of getting one. He recommends that, if approved, this repair work (total cost for both buildings is \$2050), be charged to the Building and Maintenance - Restricted Account. Jack also discussed the possibility of planting a tree in the children's play yard or doing a planting in the churchyard between the front of the office building and the new church (after removing the Live Oak Tree) in memory of Latrelle Stockton. Although there was no vote taken, the Vestry was not in favor of removing the Live Oak Tree.

Deacon's Report: Rev. Dcn. Burt continues to be absent due to work.

Rector's Report: (Rev. Denise) Rev. Denise gave an update on the status of the office computer that is used by our secretary, Karen Hidalgo. Windows 10 was added to it by Tabor Computers for \$75; Calhoun-McLain was consulted and recommended the purchase of Quickbooks Non-Profit for \$361. At this time, office computer needs are being met with these additions. Rebecca suggests that a new computer may be needed in the next 2-3 years. Parochial Report was presented for review by Rev. Denise. Rev. Denise discussed how our Bylaws may not reflect actual practice in the selection of Senior Warden. A Vestry Retreat will be planned during the summer to look at Bylaws. Rebecca volunteered to OCR (scan the paper document and change to electronic document) the Bylaws before the Retreat. Check Signers will continue to be the current four: Anne Roller, Jennifer Martinez, Beverly Thompson, Wes Chapman. The plan to give \$500 for two pavers at Honey Creek in appreciation and thanksgiving for the ministry of Bishop Benhase and his wife (previously approved – with \$250 being paid by

ECW and \$250 being paid by Clergy Discretionary Fund) was reviewed. Vestry further discussed the proposal by Jack to make a monetary gift from Annunciation to the Diocesan Vehicle Fund for Bishop Benhase. Rev. Denise asked Vestry members to make note of important upcoming events: Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper on 2/25 from 5:30 pm to 7:00 pm; Ash Wednesday Services at 7 am, 12 noon and 6 pm; Lenten Study "A Spring in the Desert" by Frank and Victoria Logue beginning on 3/4/2020 and continuing for four more Wednesday's in Lent at 6 pm with soup and bread; ECW Coffee Hour on 3/8 after 10:30 service; Acolyte Practice on Sunday, 3/8 at noon with lunch; St. Patrick's Day Covered Dish on 3/15 at 11:45 am; Casting Crowns Concert/Youth Trip on 3/21 in Savannah; Vestry Meeting on 3/23 at 5:30 pm; Youth Sunday on 3/29 with lunch and program to follow 10:30 am service.

Business:

1. Rebecca moved that Frank Champion be appointed as Treasurer of The Episcopal Church of the Annunciation, 2nd by Jerry, motion passed. A letter stating that Frank Champion is Treasurer will be presented to our different church accounts so that Frank is able to access these accounts.
2. Rebecca moved to approve the repair work on the fascia board on the Parish Hall (cost of \$650) and the repair work on the wall, trim, and fascia on the Office Building (cost of \$1400) as presented by Jack; 2nd by Jerry, motion passed. This cost (total of \$2050) will be charged to the Building and Maintenance – Restricted Account.
3. \$500 has been given in memory of Latrelle Stockton to be used to plant a tree. After discussion, it was decided that Rebecca will consult with the ladies of the church who have children who enjoy the play yard regarding the possibility of planting a shade tree in the play area or elsewhere in the church yard.
4. The Parochial Report was presented for review by the Vestry; it is due on March 1st to Diocesan office. Jerry moved to approve the Parochial Report, 2nd by Dorsey, motion passed.
5. Jack moved to make a \$250 gift towards the Diocesan Vehicle Fund for Bishop Benhase, 2nd by Dorsey, motion passed. This will come from the Restricted Fund – Outreach; donations may also be made to this fund by Parishioners.
6. Day and time for ongoing monthly Vestry Meetings will be the fourth Monday at 5:30 pm; approved by General Consent.
7. Counter duties for March were assigned.
8. Ministry Area assignments were made.
