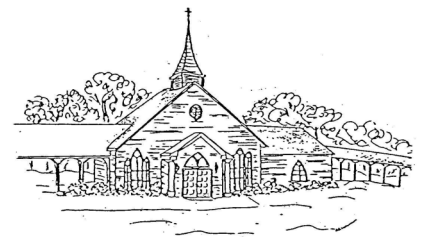

Dear People of Annunciation,

Several years ago I found a wonderful book titled *Christmas Stories for the Heart*. This book is filled with tender and uplifting short Christmas Stories written by a variety of well-known Christian writers. I would like to share one of these stories with you written by Heywood Broun titled '*Frankincense and Myrrh*.'

Once there were three kings in the East and they were wise men. They read the heavens and they saw a certain strange star by which they knew that in a distant land the King of the world was to be born. The star beckoned to them and they made preparations for a long journey.

From their palaces they gathered rich gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. Great sacks of precious stuffs were loaded upon the backs of the camels which were to bear them on their journey. Everything was in readiness, but one of the wise men seemed perplexed and would not come at once to join his two companions, who were eager and impatient to be on their way in the direction indicated by the star.

They were old, these two kings, and the other wise man was young. When they asked him he could not tell why he waited. He knew that his treasures had been ransacked for rich gifts for the King of Kings. It seemed that there was nothing more which he could give, and yet he was not content. He made no answer to the old men who shouted to him that the time had come. The camels were impatient and swayed and snarled. The shadows across the desert grew longer. And still the young king sat and thought deeply.

At length he smiled, and he ordered his servants to open the great treasure sack upon the back of the first of his camels. Then he went into a high chamber to which he had not been since he was a child. He rummaged about and presently came out and approached the caravan. In his hand he carried something which glistened in the sun. The kings thought that he bore some new gift more rare and precious than any which they had been able to find in all their treasure rooms. They bent down to see, and even the camel drivers peered from the backs of the great beasts to find out what it was which gleamed in the sun. They were curious about this last gift for which all the caravan had waited.

And the young king took a toy from his hand and placed it upon the sand. It was dog tin, painted white and speckled with black spots. Great patches of paint had worn away and left the metal clear, and that was why the toy shone in the sun as if it had been silver. The youngest of the wise men turned a key in the side of the little black and white dog and then he stepped aside so that the kings and the camel drivers could see. The dog leaped high in the air and turned a somersault. He turned another and another and then fell over upon his side and lay there with a painted grin upon his face.

A child, the son of a camel driver, laughed and clapped his hands, but the kings were stern. They rebuked the youngest of the wise men and he paid no attention but called to his chief servant to make the first of all the camels kneel. Then he picked up the toy of tin and, opening the treasure sack, placed his last gift with his own hands in the mouth of the sack so that it rested safely upon the soft bags of incense.

"What folly has seized you?" cried the eldest of the wise men. "Is this a gift to bear to the King of Kings in the far country?" and the young man answered and said: "For the King of Kings there are gifts of great richness, gold and frankincense and myrrh. "But this," he said, "is for the child in Bethlehem."

Annual Meeting Sunday, January 31, 2021

The Annual Meeting is an important moment in the life of an Episcopal Church. As a denomination, we are governed by our members. Members are those 16 and older who have been baptized or confirmed in the Episcopal Church. If baptism or confirmation did not happen at Annunciation, then a letter of Transfer from another Episcopal Church is needed. At the Annual Meeting, we make important decisions together. We elect members of our vestry. Vestry members are representatives of the parish with specific responsibilities by the canons of the Episcopal Church. They share leadership responsibilities with the rector. Also, during the annual meeting, the parish receives reports from ministries, the treasurer, and a “State of the Church” report from the rector.

The Good Book Club 2021: The Gospel of Mark

Begin 2021 with the Gospel of Mark! The Good Book Club returns to read the earliest and shortest of the four gospels, starting Friday, January 1, 2021, through Shrove Tuesday, February 16. Mark opens with words from the prophet Isaiah: “See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you,” and indeed the gospel itself serves as a messenger for the life and ministry of Jesus. Written around 65-75 CE, Mark proclaims the good news that Jesus is the messiah and Son of God.

What is the Good Book Club?

The Good Book Club is an invitation to all Episcopalians to join in reading the Gospel of Mark during Epiphany 2021. Episcopalians will read a section every day through the Epiphany season. In surveys taken before and after the first Good Book Club project in 2018 (reading the Gospel of Luke and the Book of Acts), participants reported growth in their understanding of scripture and a deepening of their prayer life. Perhaps most significantly, the percentage of people who reported reading the Bible on a daily basis increased to 73 percent at the end of the first Good Book Club reading, from 45 percent when it began.

Already, individuals, congregations, and organizations have committed to being a part of the Good Book Club, and we hope you'll join the journey too!

Why read the Bible?

People who read scripture with an open heart grow in faith through their encounter with the sacred stories of the Bible. We know this to be true in our personal experiences — and we have research to back it up. RenewalWorks, a Forward Movement research-based initiative, has data from nearly half a million participants that identify scripture engagement as a key catalyst for spiritual vitality in congregations and for individuals. In other words, if you want to grow and strengthen your faith, reading scripture is the perfect exercise.

Will there be other resources?

Yes! Much like the 2018 Lent-Easter Good Book Club, both Forward Movement and many partners from across the Episcopal Church will provide resources to support you on the journey through the Gospel of Mark. Good Book Club 2018 resources included podcasts, Bible study guides, books, blogs, videos, and more. We're looking forward to inspiring and spiritual resources that will be carefully crafted for the Gospel of Mark 2021. Check back to see what wonderful resources will be offered for this initiative.

Vestry Meeting Minutes – Annunciation – November 23, 2020 at 5:30 pm

Members Present: The Very Reverend Denise Vaughn, Jack Dell, Jerry Yates, Rebecca Miller, Dorsey McMichael

Meeting opened by Rev. Denise with prayer.

Study of Acts 26 was completed; meeting was held in the Parish Hall with social distancing and masks due to coronavirus.

Vestry Meeting minutes for October 2020 (held 11/1/2020) were reviewed; Jerry moved to approve minutes, 2nd by Rebecca, motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: (Frank) October 2020 Financial Report was reviewed. Income for October was \$7799; October expenses total was \$12,843 with a deficit of \$5044. Year to date actual deficit is \$24,638. Restricted funds balance is \$39,606. Frank continues to pursue a copy of the governing document for the BOA Investment Fund. Jack moved to approve the October Financial Report, 2nd by Rebecca, motion passed.

Senior Warden's Report: (Rebecca) Pine straw has been placed in the beds; planter has been planted; roses have been trimmed. The plan to have wood from the Live Oak Tree treated, milled, and a bench built in memory of Rev. Ron Southerland was further discussed. Curt McMichael may build the bench; Ed Wonn may take care of the treatment and milling of the wood. Rebecca will talk with the involved parties to coordinate.

Junior Warden's Report: (Jack) Jack thanked Rebecca for doing a very good job placing pine straw in the beds. He presented a document with a list of long-range projects for grounds and buildings that may be considered for completion in the next two or three years. Jack also gave an update on the video live-streaming project. Installation of the equipment was completed on November 19, 2020. Rev. Denise and Christina Storkamp have received training on how to operate the equipment. Hopefully the system will be up and running next Sunday.

Dorsey and Beverly gave a report on Diocesan Convention which they attended virtually on November 6th and 7th. It was a different experience as the Diocese of Georgia carried out their first attempt at holding a virtual convention due to the pandemic. There were some glitches, but mostly the convention ran smoothly and was an enjoyable experience. Many subjects were discussed, committee reports were shared, and several positions were filled by election. Bishop Logue reported that about 1/2 of our 69 congregations in the Diocese of Georgia are meeting for worship in some way; about 1/4 or 1/3 of our congregations have not participated in worship since March, online or otherwise. Bishop Logue's primary call to each of us was to find ways to stay connected to each other and to Jesus; he wants us to remember that God will never leave us or forsake us.

Deacon's Report: Rev. Dcn. Burt continues to be absent due to work.

Rector's Report: (Rev. Denise) Rev. Denise shared the Diocese of Georgia's Phase 1 Guidance for In-Person Worship, as revised on November 11, 2020. The use of Prayer Books and bulletins will now be allowed. The use of masks, social distancing, and hand sanitizer will continue. The maximum number of people allowed for indoor services remains the same. No congregational singing is permitted indoors. The vestry is encouraged to closely monitor outbreaks of COVID-19 in our area and to make appropriate changes to worship services as needed. Our Church office will be closed on November 25 – 28 for Thanksgiving. First Sunday of Advent is November 29, with Advent Wreaths, Angel Tree, and Youth Sunday. Advent Bible Study via Zoom, "Walking the Way of Love", will be held on December 2, 9, and 16 at 6 pm. Greening of the Church is planned for December 21st and 22nd; time to be announced. Fred and Karen Warnock are donating 2 cedar trees to be used in the church for Christmas. Christmas Eve Candlelight Services will be held at 4 pm, 6 pm, and 10:30 pm; sign up for services with Dorsey McMichael. Annual meeting will be held Sunday, 1/31/2021; voting may occur by mail in order to achieve a quorum, due to pandemic. Next Vestry Meeting will be December 21st at 5:30 pm.

Business:

Rebecca moved that a letter be written by Frank Champion to Canon Katie Easterling requesting a copy of the governing document for our BOA Investment Fund, including information about restrictions and rules regarding withdrawals from the fund; 2nd by Jack, motion passed.

Frank Champion reported that 14 pledge cards have been submitted for 2021, with total giving pledged at this time in the amount of \$90,900.

Rector's Health Insurance and HSA for 2021 was discussed. Rev. Denise is changing to Medicare Health Insurance beginning on January 1, 2021, which will result in some difference in cost. This matter is tabled and will be discussed further at December vestry meeting, when more information is available for consideration.

Ministry Area Reports: Already covered during meeting.

Meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer at 7:00 pm.
