Dear People of Annunciation,



Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. What a year it has been! In regular times, the Rector's report attempts to sum up what has happened since the last annual meeting, of which I will try to do, and look forward to the coming year. At last year's meeting, none of us had any idea what was ahead for us and we still do not know what this year will bring. The medical experts are saying it may be fall before we can possibly return to some kind of normal. Our prayers have been answered...there is a vaccine but the major question now is: will there be enough of the vaccine to go around and if there is, will enough people agree to take it so that we can gain herd immunity. Only time will tell....

So here we are. I will be perfectly honest with you that this year has been one of the most difficult years I have experienced in my 23 years of ordained ministry. No amount of seminary training or on the job training could have prepared me for the changes that I (we) had to face this past year. Not only did I have to learn how to better navigate the technological world-not exactly where my gifts lie. But I had to adapt to trying to do pastoral care over the phone instead of in person and I had to balance out what would be most spiritually beneficial for everyone, with what I needed to do to keep us safe in the face of this pandemic. As I said, it has been a difficult year and I know it has been for you also.

As the virus began to spread our entire life at Annunciation became different. At first, we closed our doors and stayed home thinking this would all be over soon but as time went on and the numbers continued to climb we quickly realized that we needed to figure out how to live-stream our services. I am very thankful to Danielle Turoski and Christina Storkamp for helping us navigate that hurdle. We used our phones at first to live-stream the services. And thank goodness that seemed to work well enough because as the number of COVID-19 cases continued to rise, our worst fears became apparent when we knew we would not be able to have in-person worship for Holy Week and Easter services. An early sunrise Easter service was held outside and it was so well received, I plan on an early outside service for Easter again this year. Hopefully, the COVID numbers will be down by April 4, so we can have a more normal looking Easter day.

But, even if that happens, we will continue to live-stream our services for two reasons; one of course is until this virus is no longer, but more importantly, because it has proved to be a good outreach tool. There have been times when up to 80 people or more have watched our live-streamed services. Because of this, the Vestry decided it would be good for us to continue to live- stream, even after the pandemic is over, but with more sophisticated equipment than just a phone. With the help of Southern Technology Partners, we were able to determine what equipment was needed and with your help, purchase our video-streaming equipment. As you know, it has been installed and thanks to Christina we have been working out the kinks. If you are interested in learning how to run the equipment on Sunday morning, it's not that hard, please let me, or Christina know.

Yet, in the face of everything this year, there is a lot to be grateful for. I am very grateful that you continued to support our church, not only financially but you continued to be the church out there in the world, in the best way you could. You were walking in the way of Love. Just to refresh our memories: the way of love is a way of life committed to following Jesus and committed to a set of practices: Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, Go, and Rest. Our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry has spoken a lot about this way of life and I've spoken quite a bit about this way of being Christian also. For the Advent study in December, several of us read the book "Walking the Way of Love" where the authors spelled out a step-by-step way to nurture a profound friendship with God, in Christ. I highly recommend everyone read this excellent book. Our bishop +Frank wrote the chapter on worship.

This coming year we can't fully know when or if we will go back to some kind of normal. We all hope and pray but in the mean time, myself, my staff, Karen and Glen, and your vestry will continue to carry on the work of the church. And we ask that you do also. You stepped up this past year and you can see from the year-end financial figures that we did a bit better than what we had projected for the year. Some of that had to do with the fact that we closed our doors for three months so we were able to spend less. But it also means that you continued to see your church as a priority. Thank you. Unfortunately, we did end the year with a deficit budget and we project a deficit budget again this next year. It's a reality that we can't continue to have a deficit budget for too many more years. My prayer and hope is that when this pandemic is over we will continue to grow. So that one day we will be able to have that balanced budget. I hope you will pray and work for this to happen also.

My greatest fear when this pandemic is over, and I'm going to be honest with you, is that this pandemic will change how we do church in the future. Now, not all change is bad. It can be good. The Church has always found ways to adapt to what's going on out there in the world and still come together to worship and serve the Lord. This coming together to worship in a building is where I see the change may happen as more and more people decide to stay home on Sunday mornings and watch the live-streamed service. Time will tell.






Diocese to Offer Daily Reflections in Lent

Monday through Friday will be reflections on the Daily Office readings, Saturday reflections will be focused on a spiritual practice that you may be able to incorporate into your routine, and Sunday will be dedicated to a reflection of a piece of music. These reflections may be used as a resource for your congregation or as a personal guide through Lent.

The reflections will begin on Ash Wednesday and carry through to Easter Sunday. These reflections continue with the theme for November's convention. Jesus gave this image of him as the vine and us as the branches to his followers on the night before he died as he knew they


Bishop Curry to meet with us online

Vestry Meeting Minutes – Annunciation – January 25, 2021 at 5:30 pm

Members Present: The Very Reverend Denise Vaughn, Rebecca Miller, Jack Dell, Teresa Barrera-Edge, Jerry Yates (By Phone)

Members Absent: Dorsey McMichael, Matt Storkamp

Meeting opened by Rev. Denise with prayer.

Study of Acts 28 was completed; meeting was held in the Parish Hall with social distancing and masks worn due to coronavirus pandemic.

Vestry Meeting minutes for December 2020 were reviewed; Rebecca moved to approve minutes, 2nd by Teresa, motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: (Denise for Frank) The December 2020 Financial Report, including end-of-year status, was reviewed. Income for December was \$20,772, December expenses total was \$12,232, with net income of \$8540. End-of-year income for 2020 is \$160,271; end-of-year expenses total is \$166,419; with end-of-year deficit in the amount of \$6148. It was noted that around \$15,500 was withdrawn from our two investment funds during 2020 and was placed in the general fund; this amount is reported on the end-of-year financial report as income for 2020. Rebecca moved to approve the December Financial Report, 2nd by Jack, motion passed.

Senior Warden's Report: (Rebecca) Rebecca plans to draft a letter to Canon Katie Easterling with request for governing document for the BOA Investment Fund account this week. Rebecca thanked Jack and Denise and all the vestry for their help this year. She feels that it has been a good year even with all the difficulties the pandemic has brought. Rebecca plans to continue serving on the grounds committee as well as in other ways in the life of our church.

Junior Warden's Report: (Denise for Jack) Jack has presented an estimate in the amount of \$300 for time and materials to repair and replace the rotted facia board on the outside of the church. Greg Faust will complete the work by mid-February. Removal of the Live Oak tree is needed. Frank Champion will be consulted. Rebecca said that Mario can help by chopping off some of the limbs and taking them away. Jack said that he will be glad to assist the new Junior Warden if needed; Rev. Denise said that will be much appreciated.

Deacon's Report: Rev. Dcn. Burt continues to be absent due to work.

Rector's Report: (Rev. Denise) Rev. Denise thanked both Rebecca and Jack for their service on Vestry as Senior Warden and Junior Warden. They will be missed! She shared that the Diocesan office continues to send out weekly reports regarding guidance for church services and church activities while the pandemic continues. Rev. Denise happily reported that another \$500 has been donated to the fund for the purchase and installation of our live-stream video equipment; with this donation, the full cost of the equipment has been covered through donations, with no funds needed from the general fund. Our Annual Parish Meeting is planned for Sunday, January 31, at 11:30 AM; it will be outside – weather permitting. There will be a short vestry meeting after the Annual Parish Meeting. Ash Wednesday Services will be held on February 17 at 7 AM, 12 noon, and 6 PM. Our Lenten Study will be "Are We There Yet?" and will begin on Wednesday, February 24 at 6 PM via Zoom; it will continue on March 3, 10, 17, 24. February Vestry Meeting date and time is to be determined.

Business:

- 1. 2021 Budget was presented and reviewed. Jack moved to approve the 2021 budget with two annotations: Line Item 65020 should be -0- and Line item 1606 should be \$5500, 2nd by Teresa, motion passed.

Junior Warden Report

2021 Church Annual Meeting

The Junior Warden is charged with the care of Church Property.

Major activities undertaken during 2020 included:

- 1. Locating and repairing a leak in the main line that brings water from the city water meter to the church property. Leak was caused by roots from the Live Oak tree next to the office building. Cost to repair was \$1,850.00. To prevent further damage to the Church property, the Vestry voted to have this tree removed. Cost to remove the tree using a tree surgeon was \$975.00. A member of the church volunteered to remove the tree. That action is planned for 2021.
- 2. Routine maintenance on the shrubbery around the church.
- 3. Work on the irrigation system, including replacing several damaged Sprinkler heads.
- 4. Routine maintenance on the church buildings. Property maintenance plans for 2021 include:
- 1. Repair and Maintenance of Church Buildings as necessary.
- 2. Continuing maintenance of Church grounds as necessary.
- 3. Perform additional landscaping around the Church as necessary.
- 4. Utilize the wood from the Live Oak Tree to build a bench, in Memory of Father Ron Southerland.
- 5. Landscape the area where the Live Oak Tree is currently standing. After the tree is removed, there will be approximately 600 sq. ft. of ground that will need re-landscaping.

Parents drove their children by the church and picked up their treats, while wearing masks and staying socially distanced. Together, ECW and the whole congregation were able to help EIGHT families with their Christmas wishes through the Angel Tree in 2020. Walmart gift certificates were also provided to each family. Current balance in ECW account is: \$2450.00. The members of ECW look forward to spreading God's glory through service and fellowship, doing as much as possible as pandemic safety restrictions continue in 2021. We also hope and pray that we are able to return to our very much missed face-to-face activities as the pandemic subsides in 2021.

Outreach Report

Outreach Activities for the year included:

- Annunciation continues to donate \$50 monthly to the United Way and Salvation Army. We also donate \$100 a month to J.D. Dickerson Backpack Buddies program.
- From the rector's discretionary fund, a donation of \$100 was sent to East Georgia Fellowship of Christian Athletes and a donation of \$100 to Toombs Co. Family Connection for a family in need after a fire. Also, one or two people each month were helped with hotel rooms and/or electric bills.
- Donations are ongoing for non-perishable food and other items for the Refuge and for SOAPS.
- Donation boxes are located in the Narthex.
- Our food pantry located in the old sanctuary has helped 25 or more. The ECW purchased
- a larger refrigerator last year to store perishable foods for the pantry. Donations are always needed.
- The Little Free Library located on church grounds is filled with books for the neighborhood to access for reading.
- Girl Scout Troop #30132 met twice a month in our Parish Hall until March when COVID-19 shut down this activity.
- School Supplies were collected in July and donated to J.D. Dickerson's Elementary School.
- A memorial service for the spreading of pet ashes in the St. Francis Memorial Garden and the Blessing of the Pets took place in October. Pet food and supplies were collected and donated to SOAPS.
- Items were collected for the Samaritan's Purse Operation Christmas Child Project and 12 shoeboxes were packed and sent.
- Video Live-Streaming Equipment was purchased and installed in the church with donations from
- parishioners.
- This past Christmas, eight families were helped with Christmas gifts from the ECW Angel Tree and \$75 WalMart gift cards from donations. An additional family was helped with a \$100 Visa gift card.

Adult Christian Education Report

Unfortunately, our Adult Christian Education offerings were fewer and much different this past year because of COVID-19.
