Dear People of Annunciation,

I am grateful to you, and to all the members of our congregation. Throughout the year I have witnessed such generosity as you contribute your ideas, your funds, and your time to our community. Every dollar that we raise, every minute of volunteerism, every good plan comes from the heart and goes toward our mission.

Our pledge campaign this year focuses on the miracle of sharing, the ways in which our means meet the needs of the world, the ways in which we respond to the Gospel, the ways in which we sustain our community. Our theology of giving focuses on the three-legged stool of *Wealth, Works, and Wisdom,* the ways in which we make our gifts to the world. In today's letter, I would like to focus on Wisdom.

Our ancient texts treat Wisdom in a personified manner, in some of our traditions, almost as a fourth member of the Godhead. Wisdom is a source of inspiration, creativity, and guidance that has been a part of the world since it was chaos. Wisdom smooths out the edges of our Creation and gives us ways to make order, plan for change, prepare for renewal, appreciate what we have. She (the pronoun often ascribed to Wisdom) is in all of us, resonant, reactive, reaching forward to make connections with our traditions and culture and experience.

More Than Enough, the theme for our campaign, brings us back to that moment of miracle described in Luke's Gospel, having just been fed by Jesus from a scant few loaves and fishes. The people in that story heard Jesus' call to share what they had in order that all might benefit; and that is what you do with the gift of Wisdom you possess. When we have strategies that need to be developed, or committees that need to be staffed, or problems that need to be solved, you answer the call of your church, and share your wisdom and experience.

Wisdom adds to wisdom, and our whole community is filled with inspiration and action. You are that inspiration and action, without whom our church and our ministry would be diminished. In a few weeks, you will receive an invitation to name and pledge the gifts you will make in the coming year to help our church and our neighbors. I ask that you pray with us as we launch our annual gathering of gifts and gratitude, and consider how you will contribute your gift of wisdom.

Theological Statement

When Elijah meets the widow of Zarephaph, as the story is told to us in First Kings, he asks to be fed from the very last of her stores. She explains to him that she's gathering wood for the fire she'll make to cook the last meal she expects to eat before she and her son die of starvation. Still, he asks her to make him some bread.

Even though Elijah promises that she won't run out of flour and oil, how can she know this is true? The first miracle of the story is that she shares the very last that she has with this entitled man who is asking for food and drink. In my opinion it overshadows the other miracles that follow – the never-empty jugs of oil and flour – because for the first miracle to be effective, the widow must first make the most daring risk.

I see this miracle replayed often in the Church. When faced with diminished resources, I have witnessed congregations get creative, roll up their sleeves, and find ways to engage their mission. In situations where old models were failing to attract new energy, I have seen members volunteer their ideas, their wisdom, to help a congregation move beyond its capacity. I have seen vestries take risks in order to extend more services, more ministry in their communities, even if the path to staffing or funding it wasn't immediately clear.

In every one of these circumstances, miracles were present, because in every one of these circumstances there was more than enough. More than enough people to do the work, more than enough money to cover the costs, more than enough creativity to carry the project forward. Even when we feel depleted, there is more than enough.

Maybe the recent pandemic has made you wonder if your congregation will be able to continue, able to provide ministry and pay the bills. Maybe you have had to make serious adjustments in your own household budget or your plans. Our stewardship of our personal and collective resources reminds us of the abundance around us. There will be more than enough because our faith will unlock the generosity of others. Expect miracles. | ¹⁰⁵ org






United Thank Offering

The Difficult Words of Jesus Study begins Wednesday, September 28, at 6:00 pm in the Parish Hall.

There are times when Jesus taught things that seem problematic to contemporary readers. His comments lead to difficult questions about family values, economics, social justice, and religious respect. Jesus spoke 2,000 years ago, but the questions he raises are the ones with which we continue to struggle. In *The Difficult Words of Jesus*, Amy-Jill Levine shows how these difficult teachings would have sounded to the people who first heard them, how have they been understood over time, and how we



might interpret them in the context of the Gospel of love and reconciliation. A six-week study that includes a DVD featuring Dr. Levine.

Dive into the most difficult teachings of Jesus with author Dr. Amy-Jill Levine, a University Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Vanderbilt Divinity School. Dr Levine is the expert in first century Judaism and Jesus.

All are invited to attend. The book can be purchased on Amazon or other venues but it's not necessary to purchase a book. Dr. Levine knows not everyone will want to read the book, so the DVD is designed to provide enough information.

An Overview of 'The Difficult Words of Jesus' Study

Session 1 '**Sell What You Own'** examines Jesus' call to a would-be disciple to sell all his possessions. Participants will explore why Jesus believed wealth was an obstacle to living in God's realm and discuss some specific ways Jesus' words remain relevant to people who have bank accounts.

Session 2 '*Hate Father and Mother*' questions the common assumption that Scripture teaches "family values" by scrutinizing Jesus' call for his followers to "hate" their families, and even their very lives. Participants will have the opportunity to evaluate the cost of their discipleship as well as to discern how the same Jesus who taught people to love their enemy could demand any form of hatred.

Session 3 **'Slave of All'** sheds light on prevalent biblical language about slavery, including Jesus' call for his disciples to "become as slaves" to others. Participants will discern not only what this metaphor means in terms of being a faithful disciple but also whether and ofr whom slavery remains a helpful metaphor today.

Session 4 'Nowhere Among the Gentiles' reminds us that according to Matthew's Gospel, Jesus initially commanded his disciples to restrict their evangelism to "the lost sheep of the house of Israel." Participants will discuss why Jesus did not originally see Gentiles as part of his mission, and discuss how his encounter with a Gentile woman, desperate for a miracle, continues to challenge us about whom we regard as worthy of our time, attention, and care.

Session 5 '**Outer Darkness'** invites participants to reflect on their beliefs about hell-is there eternal punishment for those who do not believe the gospel? The session offers a bird's-eye view of how idea's about hell developed, and it confronts us with some of Jesus' sayings on the subject. Participants will consider whether the Gospels speak of a literal hell, and whether the idea helps or hinders how we think and how we act.

Session 6 '**Your Father the Devil**' tackles the problematic languages about "the Jews' found throughout the Gospel of John, including on the lips of Jesus, who was himself a lifelong observant Jew. Participants will hear how these Scriptures have been used to justify prejudice and violence against Jews to the present day and discuss ways to interpret them in ways that promote love instead.



Vestry Meeting Minutes – Annunciation – July 31, 2022 at 11:45 am

Members Present: The Very Reverend Denise Vaughn, Dorsey McMichael, Frank Champion, Matt Storkamp, Beverly Thompson

Meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Denise at 12:15 pm, following lunch shared by members. Vestry Meditation was read and discussed.

Vestry Meeting minutes for June 2022 were emailed to vestry members on August 1, 2022; minutes were approved as read through member responses.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: (Christina) Financial Report for May 2022 with correction made at June meeting was presented for approval; Financial Report for June 2022 was presented for review and approval. June Income was \$19,518.34 and included \$7593 transferred from Ameris Money Market Fund. June Expenses were \$24,043.15. It was noted that payment for the re-roofing of parish hall was made in June. Deficit for June is \$4524.81. Frank moved to approve both the corrected May Financial Report and the June Financial Report; 2nd by Beverly; motion passed.

Senior Warden's Report: (Dorsey) No new report from Ed Wonn on the building of the bench.

<u>Junior Warden's Report</u>: (Frank) Church has paid Jesus Hernandez to cut shrubbery. A couple of repairs are needed. 1) Front door needs work; cleaning of the mechanism should fix it. 2) Stains on ceilings in office building; Denise will spray with rubbing alcohol to kill mold and Frank will do some test spots with painting. 3) Sprinkler heads that water the cherry trees need repair; Frank will work on them.

<u>Rector's Report</u>: (Rev. Denise) Bishop Logue has requested that churches review safety measures since the Alabama shooting. Vestry discussed the issue and decided to lock doors when service starts; greeters will watch for latecomers. August 14th will be an Instructional Eucharist; Ken will help. Kristen Champion, Jane Hall, and Jen Martinez met recently with Rev. Denise to review potential Christian Education curricula; the Virginia Theological Seminaries Curriculum was chosen for Annunciation. Classes for adults and children will begin on 9/11. Audit is due 9/1/2022; Wes Chapman, Hugh Jordan will meet with Christina to complete the audit prior to 9/1/22.

Business:

- 1. Church doors will be locked at beginning of services for safety purposes.
- 2. Sunday School for children and adults will begin on 9/11/2022.
- 3. Audit will be completed by Wes Chapman, Hugh Jordan, and Christina Storkamp.
- 4. Bylaws Articles I, II, and part of III were reviewed and suggested changes were made that will be presented for approval at Annual Parish Meeting in 2023.
